INTERNATIONAL ELECTIVE PROGRAMME AT FACULTY OF MEDICAL SCIENCES, UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYEWARDENEPURA

Introduction

Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS), University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) had been accommodating foreign elective students since 1998 under 'The International Elective Programme' (IEP). It comprises of four (4) different programmes as below.

- 1) Elective attachments
- 2) Learning Anatomy with cadaveric dissections
- 3) Short Course in Forensic Medicine, Toxicology, Ethics and Law
- 4) Short course in Tropical Medicine and Infectious Diseases (annual programme)

1. ELECTIVE ATTACHMENTS (in pre-clinical, para-clinical and clinical departments)

Eligibility:

- For a clinical elective: The applicant has to be an international medical students studying in an overseas medical school in their clinical years with a minimum of 2 months of prior clinical experience (A letter should be provided from the Medical school to confirm).
- For a pre or para-clinical elective: The applicant has to be an international medical student studying in an overseas medical school with a minimum of 2 months of prior experience in the enrolled medical school.

Duration: 1 to 8 weeks per academic year (as chosen by the student)

- Minimum duration in one department 1-2 weeks
- Maximum duration for entire elective 8 weeks

Course fee:

- **USD 100 per week for all elective appointments**

In addition to the above weekly fee, all elective students should pay a **non-refundable application process fee of USD 20** if your application is accepted to be processed irrespective of the duration of the elective. Once you submit your application with the other required documents; student confirmation and permission grant letter from your medical school, your CV and the cover letter, the elective coordinator will check for your eligibility and will inform you to pay the application process fee (20USDs) and ask you to email the payment receipt/screenshot of the online banking receipt. Once the coordinator receives the payment receipt emailed by you, your offer letter will be issued the within 7 working days.

Commencement: All round the year (Always check with the elective coordinator for availability of the clinical elective programme before you to register)

Medium of teaching: English

Medium of communication of patients: Local languages (mostly) or English. Your peer Sri Lankan students will assist you with English translations.

- Colombo South Teaching Hospital, Kalubowila (clinical specialties)
- Faculty of Medical Sciences, University of Sri Jayewardenepura, Nugegoda (pre-clinical or para-clinical subjects/laboratory experience, research and Family Medicine)
- Community based clinics for Community Medicine appointment

How to apply:

- Applications can be submitted at any time during the course of the year. (Clinical department electives will not be conducted during December due to Final year assessments. Therefore, we advise you to check with elective coordinator for availability)
- You may spend the requested period in one discipline throughout the stay or split and stay in number of different disciplines according to your preference.

IMPORTANT:

Students who wish to sit for the ERPM examination in Sri Lanka in due course will not be enrolled on this elective programme.

2. LEARNING ANATOMY WITH CADAVERIC DISSECTIONS

"Dissections make learning Anatomy more interesting"

Cadaveric dissection provides the student to grasp a clear visuospatial picture of the organization of human body, experience the texture of human tissues, witness and comprehend pathological conditions while learning the normal in a realistic nature. This is only an observer post.

Eligibility:

- Having registration as a medical student in an established overseas medical school/university

Duration: 1 to 8 weeks per academic year

Course fee:

- USD 100 per week for all elective appointments

In addition to the above fee, all elective students should pay a **non-refundable application process fee of USD 20**, irrespective of the duration of the elective

Commencement: All round the year (Please check with the elective coordinator to avoid the vacation time of the local students)

Medium of teaching: English

Location: Department of Anatomy, Faculty of Medical Sciences, University of Sri Jayewardenepura, Nugegoda

3. THE ELECTIVE SHORT COURSE IN FORENSIC MEDICINE, TOXICOLOGY, ETHICS AND LAW

Who should apply?

Undergraduate Medical Students after completing the basic sciences and having a minimum of 6 months of clinical exposure can apply for this course. The ability to understand and communicate in English is a prerequisite. English language tests are not required.

IMPORTANT:

Students who wish to sit for the ERPM examination in Sri Lanka in due course will not be enrolled on this course.

Duration:

- 2 weeks (excluding weekends and Public holidays). The duration of study time on each working day is 9-3 pm.

Course fee:

- 400 US\$

Registration Fee: Non-refundable USD 50 for all medical students

Course dates:

- Any period of the year with prior approval by the Head, Department of Forensic Medicine

Maximum students that could be accommodated at a given time - 05

Medium – English

Teaching-learning methods and Course materials:

This is a full-time short course which will continue for 2 weeks. During this time a student will be exposed to lectures, LMS sessions, and self-studies through recorded lectures and fixed learning modules. Visiting the hospital police post, Inquirer's office will also be included.

4. SHORT COURSE IN TROPICAL MEDICINE AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES (ANNUALLY)

This course has been introduced recently and you will be able to learn a variety of viral, bacterial, fungal and parasitic diseases prevalent in the tropics. The course commences in the first week of May each year and will be advertised annually in November each year.

Eligibility:

- Medical student studying in an overseas medical school in their clinical years with minimum of 2 months of prior clinical experiences (A letter should be provided from the Medical school to confirm).
- A working doctor (A letter should be provided from the employer)

Duration:

- 2-3 weeks (Duration may change annually based on the availability of resources)

Course fee: 1000 US\$

Registration Fee: Non-refundable 100 US\$ for doctors and 50 US\$ for medical students

REGISTRATION AND COMMENCING THE ELECTIVE

Register on day 1 prior to visit the hospital (on any weekday from 8am to 4pm)

- For registration, visit office of Deputy Registrar (DR) of Faculty of Medical Sciences, University of Sri Jayewardenepura (located next to Dean's office)
- **Pre requisites for registration:**
 - 01) The letter issued from the USJ dean's office confirming elective appointment
 - 02) Proof of payment* (payment receipts)
 - 03) Proof for Identity (eg: Passport)
 - 04) Two Passport size Photographs
 - 05) A letter from your Faculty/University/Medical school confirming the studentship and approving the elective attachment

***Important:** You will have to complete the full payment of the elective course that is mentioned in the offer letter prior to commencement. Both bank receipts/ screenshots of the online banking receipt of application process fee/ and the elective fee has to be submitted to the DR for them to issue you the commencement letter. You will not be permitted to commence the elective without the payment receipts and the commencement letter.

Please note:

The bank charges & other taxes should be borne by the applicant. The student name must be clearly mentioned as a reference at payment.

Meeting the supervisor

- After registration, visit the relevant ward at Colombo South Teaching Hospital (or the relevant department at FMS) and show the commencement letter to your supervisor to start the appointment.

Suitable attire

- Long trousers, light coloured short sleeved shirts (or long but folded sleeved shirts) and formal shoes are appropriate to hospital during day time. More comfortable attire can be selected for evening/ overnight stays. However please note that clothing such as shorts, tights, short dresses, vests, tank tops, slippers/flip-flops and bright shiny coloured clothes etc. are not considered appropriate inside the hospital or University (Colombo is warm and humid with average temperature of 28-30°C mostly.)

Clinical coat/Scrub

Medical students are expected to be dressed in clinical coats inside the hospital. When stocks exist clinical coats can be purchased from faculty office. Please inquire from Senior Assistant Registrar/ Deputy Registrar at registration.

In the absence of white coats, the scrubs you wear in your own medical schools will be allowed with prior permission taken from the Elective coordinator.

FEW IMPORTANT NOTES FOR THE ATTENTION OF ELECTIVE STUDENTS

- Please note that the month of April is a holiday season in Sri Lanka and most of the activities get slowed down during mid-April. Hospital will stay functioning, yet the turnover of patients may be lower than usual.
- Whenever the final year local students are having their clinical examinations, the wards will be out of bound for all students including elective students. Usually the final year examinations will be held during early December, but dates may change depending on other administrative factors so please inquire from the elective coordinator electives@sjp.ac.lk or Deputy Registrar (DR) drfms@sjp.ac.lk if applying for clinical electives.
- **Certificate of attendance**
 - We are issuing a certificate of attendance to all the elective students. Remember to collect it from office/assistant registrar at the end of your appointment.
- **Evaluation Form**
 - Please remember to get supervisor to fill any evaluation form issued from your university at the end of the appointment

ABOUT UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYEWARDENEPURA



We welcome you to the largest state owned University in Sri Lanka with over 16,000 students studying in 11 faculties. This is the only University in Sri Lanka which owns a 'Faculty of Medical Sciences' producing graduates in medicine and human biological sciences.

The University is committed to provide knowledge in an environment which values creativity, freedom of thoughts and its expression, equality, professional and personal development. The University is also involved in active service to the community through various centres and projects carried out by all 11 faculties.

Location

The University of Sir Jayewardenepura is located at Gangodawila, Nugegoda in Colombo district, Sri Lanka, only fifteen kilo meters away from the heart of Colombo. The main premise spreads over a 55 acre land.

History

The University of Sir Jayewardenepura was started as a higher education institution for Buddhists priests (Vidyodaya pirivena) in 1873. It was bestowed the University status under the Vidyodaya University and Vidyalankara University Act No 45 of 1958 and opened on 16th February 1959. Initially, the University was restricted to male students and Buddhists monks. The university was shifted to the current location in 1961 and was opened for female students since 1966. The present designation of 'University if Sri Jayewardenepura' was assigned to the institution in 1978.

Facilities available

- **Teaching-learning**—lecture theatres, auditoriums, well designed spacious library (with more than 180 000 books), computer centre for each faculty, English teaching unit
- **Self-study**- summer huts for studies, common computer centre/lobby with free internet access
- **Academic support**- career guidance unit, staff development centre
- **Welfare and Recreational** - student counselling service, book shops, assembly halls, hostels, University medical centre, family practice centre, student union offices, offices for other societies, physical education divisions, open theatre, auditoriums for entertainment events, gymnasium, swimming pool, play grounds with pavilions

Most services provided are free and accessible to all University students including elective students. In addition, there are handful of restaurants/ canteens within the University premises and they offer food and beverages at an affordable price compared to the food stalls outside the premises.



We are a unique medical school in many ways.

- We are the only ‘Faculty of Medical Sciences’ in Sri Lanka offering study programmes in medicine (MBBS) and human biological science (BSc Human Biology).
- Whilst most of the medical schools in Sri Lanka are located separately from the main institution, we are based within the main University premises itself so that our students have the opportunity to mingle with fellow students from other faculties and enjoy the facilities available in the main campus.
- Although we are only 30 years old faculty, our graduates have secured the top position in the common merit lists in undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in Sri Lanka and majority of our past students are specialists serving in Sri Lanka and overseas.

working at teaching hospitals, general practitioners, medical specialists from infectious diseases control programmes and many other health related institutions) who are involved in training our undergraduates and postgraduates. There are academic support staffs assisting smooth functioning of academic activities, research and other service components. Apart from the routine academic work, most staff members are involved in research with local and international collaborations.

ABOUT COLOMBO SOUTH TEACHING HOSPITAL (CSTH)



Introduction

Colombo South Teaching Hospital (CSTH) is the second largest government hospital in Colombo district, located in Kalubowila. The hospital has bed strength of 1110 with 2600 staff involved in patient care. It serves as the teaching hospital of the Faculty of Medical Sciences, University of Sri Jayewardenepura while functioning under the Ministry of Health. The head of the institute is the director. Ministry of Health appoints doctors, nurses and other health care workers as for allocated carder (<https://www.csth.health.gov.lk/>).

Infrastructure and facilities

In addition to the University professorial units (details given later), the hospital runs an out patients department (OPD) round the clock and serves about 750 000 out patients and 720 000 clinic patients per year. Hospital accommodates wards of all major discipline and provides treatment to about 150 000 inward patients with number of admissions ranging from 30 to 145 per day. The hospital is also equipped with intensive care units for medical, surgical and neonatal patients and a special unit to treat sexually transmitted infections. In addition to main clinical specialty of general medicine, general paediatrics, general surgery, gynaecology and antenatal clinics there are specialized clinics such as oncology, neuro-disability, renal, well baby clinic, epilepsy and neurology, multidisciplinary, asthma, endocrine & growth, sub-fertility, well women, adolescent, feto-maternal. There is also an acupuncture centre located within the hospital premises training and serving local and foreign individuals, even though it has no affiliation to the hospital.



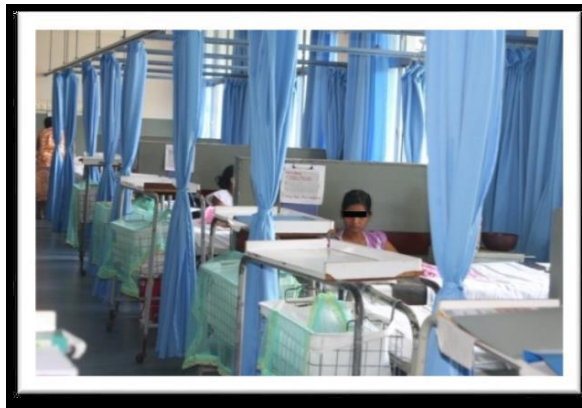
Extended faculty specialists

As well as the honorary consultants (specialists) from the faculty, there are specialists in other fields such as anaesthesia, histopathology, orthopaedics, eye surgery, neurology, ENT surgery, chemical pathology, haematology, judicial medicine, microbiology, rheumatology, dermatology, gastroenterology, radiology, gynaecology and obstetrics, oral-maxillofacial (OMF) surgery, medicine, cardiology, paediatrics, surgery, genito-urinary surgery, orthodontics, psychiatry, endocrinology, transfusion medicine, vascular and plastic surgery serving CSTH.

PROFESSORIAL UNIVERSITY UNITS AT CSTH

Professorial wards in the CSTH are allocated a number as below and located in different settings in the hospital.

Clinical teaching activities

You may be able to see a wide spectrum of surgical and medical conditions that you have probably seen only in text books before.

You will be able to (depending on the availability);

- participate in bed-side interactive teaching sessions, grand ward rounds, ward classes and small group case based discussions
- attend casualty nights to observe acute case management
- attend lectures/seminars/symposia
- visit clinics, intensive care units and labour rooms
- assist surgeries at the operation theatre
- perform minor procedure/surgeries under supervision
- visit units such as endoscopy, family planning
- do casualty night-on calls (as shadow house officer)
- visit blood bank, outpatient department



The daily routine

You are expected to visit the ward early (around 7 am) for history taking. The consultants visit the ward around 8am. Operation theatre lists commence at 8 am and the students going to the theatre should be there at least by 7.15am. Clinics commence at 8 am or 2 pm and will give you the opportunity to see a different array of patients than in the ward. Clinical training takes place throughout the day. Admission (casualty) days fall on every second or third day (depending on the specialty) on rotational basis. Your local counterparts are in their final year. We hope you will find the atmosphere and experience as friendly, helpful and inspiring.

A word of guidance to elective students regarding interacting with patients

You will have the opportunity to meet patients from a diverse socioeconomic background using hospital facilities. Not all of them communicate in English yet many understand. However when assistance is needed in communication or other matters, elective students can count on the generosity of local students or staff or bystanders. Patients come from different cultural and religious backgrounds and you are expected to treat them with respect and dignity while being sensitive to local culture and values. Almost all patients and visitors are usually cooperative and keen to lend a helping hand to a learner but please remember to ask permission before any examination or procedure. Remember to have a chaperon when examining a female patient. As a general rule, application of basic medical ethics should guide your behavior in the ward.

Obtaining Visa



Details concerning visa can be obtained from <http://www.immigration.gov.lk>. Visa can also be obtained from the Sri Lankan High Commission/embassy in your country. The Department of Immigration & Emigration (DI&E) of Sri Lanka operates a service to issue visa online “Electronic Travel Authorization (ETA)” link: <http://www.eta.gov.lk/slvisa/>.

We issue letters to facilitate visa only on request. As per our knowledge taking up study courses including electives are not allowed under tourist visa category. However we are not experts in immigration matters thus we are unable to provide any advice on visa regulations relevant to your country.

Booking a flight



Many international airlines operate services to Colombo International airport Sri Lanka. National airline in Sri Lanka is Sri Lankan airlines.

Bandaranaike International Airport (Colombo International Airport) is in Katunayake, 38km from Colombo South Teaching hospital.

Finding Accommodation



We regret that we cannot provide accommodation in University hostels due to limitation of such facilities. A list of places of accommodation (although these may not be available at all times) can be obtained from the elective coordinator.

Mount Lavinia (4.5km from Csth) and Colombo 06 (Wellawatte) (3km from Csth) has plenty of small clean nice hotels and apartment houses for rent. You can retrieve information regarding accommodation facilities to suit your budget and requirements (star class hotels, rest houses, guest houses, luxury apartments, small houses (annexes) and rooms etc.) from the web (Eg: ikman.lk).

Generally personal safety issues will not arise yet we advise you not to make any payments until you visit the place after arrival. Most travel information sites (Eg: Trip Adviser) will guide you on selection of hotel accommodation.

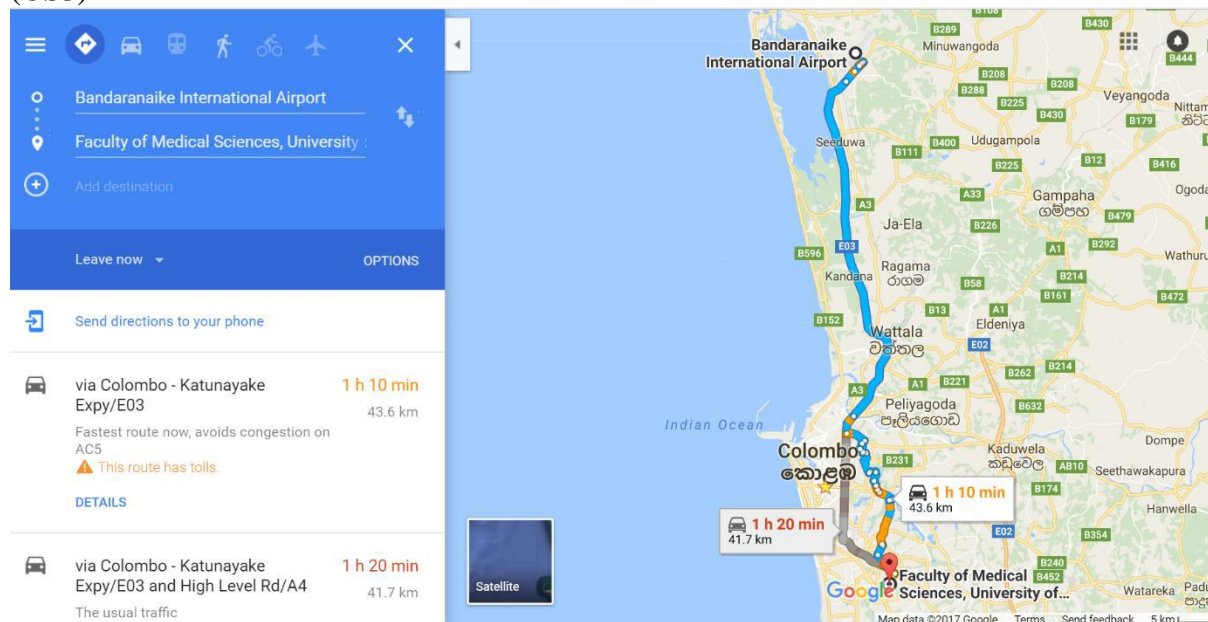

International credit cards are accepted at almost all hotels, many other shops including grocery super markets.

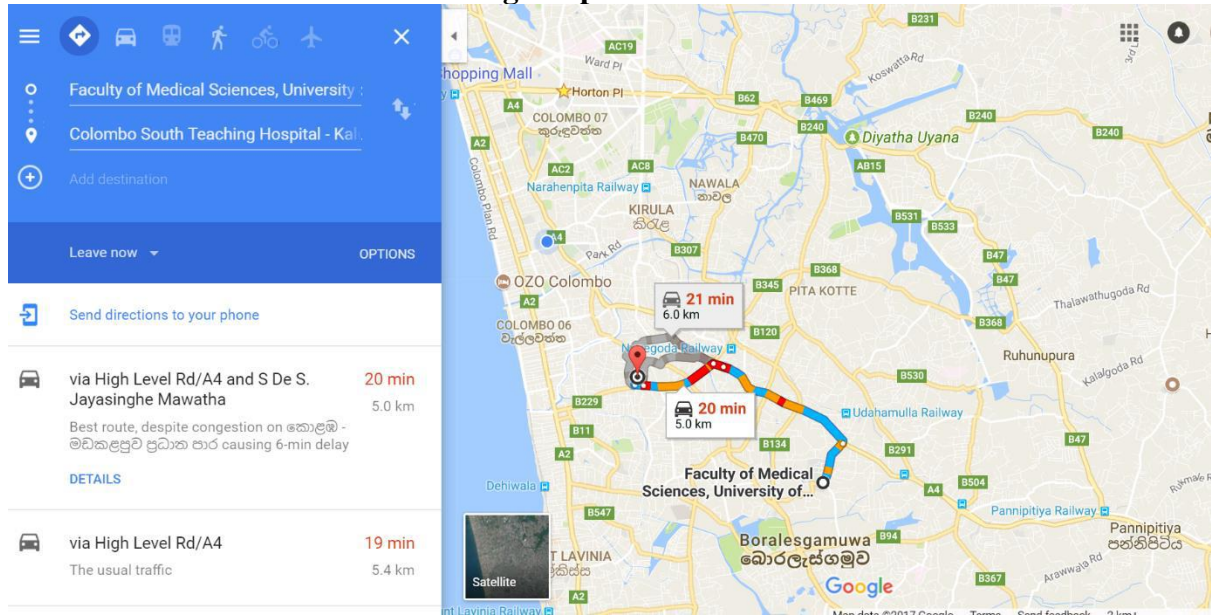
Travelling from the airport to hotel

Location of Colombo South Teaching Hospital



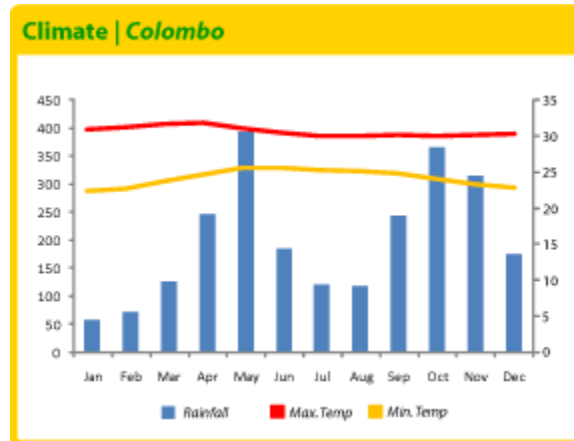

LIFE IN SRI LANKA-USEFUL FACTS

1. Health advice

Be alert about dengue! Dengue mosquito being a day biter, use of repellent is advisable. Consumption of bottled water and well cooked food from reputed hotels/ restaurants is encouraged. You can ask your local colleagues for safe eating places. There are no specific immunizations or drug prophylaxis needed prior to the visit.

2. Means of transport in Sri Lanka

Road traffic congestion: Road traffic congestion is part and parcel of Colombo life at any given time. Best is to start early and check Google map to assess time. (Worst times to be on the road are 7AM-9AM, 1.30PM-2.30PM, 4PM-6PM but technically traffic is horrendous all day long).

Trains and busses: Colombo is the centre of the island's bus and railway networks. Train is less tiring for longer distance travelling especially going to up country (Eg: Kandy, Badulla). Busses are better for short distance traveling as they are more frequent. But overcrowding is to be expected once on board in both.

Tri-shows (three wheelers/tuk-tuks): This is the more convenient and economical form of transport, till you get familiarized with the roads. Some tri-shows are metered (displayed) or more often the driver will agree on the fare before setting off. Tri-shows (three wheelers) should be used at your own risk, as there are no seat belts or doors. The driver will take to the destination quicker but at the 'cost of violating road rules'. Legitimately only three passengers can be on board.

Taxi services: The budget taxi services (seats for 3 passengers) are cheaper than the other 'luxury' cab services. They are air-conditioned and safer than tri-shows. Few budget cab operators around Csth area with good customer reviews are: Online Cabs (Pvt) Ltd 072 182 0820; Kangaroo cabs 011 2 588 588; Budget taxi 011 7299 299 <https://www.srilankabudgettaxi.lk/> for rates and booking, PickMe <http://pickme.lk/> and uber <https://www.uber.com/>.

An addition to above, there are many other taxi services operating in Sri Lanka. They have cars, vans, buses to suit your requirement. Airport drops can also be arranged through them. Rates per kilo meter and other charges involved need to be discussed with them. All have air-conditioned metered cars with reliable (most of the time) drivers.

3. Driving in Sri Lanka

There are many places offering rent a car services in Colombo. International driving license holders can drive in Sri Lanka. Driving is on the left side on the road. Seat belts are compulsory for the front passengers of motor vehicles. Helmets should be worn by all motor bicycle riders.

4. Phone and internet facilities

The international code of Sri Lanka is 0094. Public phones (coin boxes) are available on the street and in many public commercial places such as shopping malls. Communication centres on road side also offer local and international calls.

The phone plans in Sri Lanka generally do not include a free phone. There are many mobile phone service providers in Sri Lanka such as Mobitel, Dialog etc. offering competitive mobile plans and mobile broadband dongles for web access. Star class hotels offer free Wi-Fi services for customers.

5. Foreign Diplomatic Services

All foreign embassies/ consulates are located in Colombo. You can visit the respective web page to find address or contact details.

6. Public holidays

There are lot of public/bank and mercantile holidays in the Sri Lankan calendar. University offices are closed on public holidays. It is important that you check these in advanced to avoid unnecessary delays.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q-What is the hospital that I will be affiliated to during my appointment?

- Colombo South Teaching Hospital, Kalubowila

Q - How much do I have to pay?

- Elective attachments, Observer positions and Learning Anatomy with cadaver dissections
 - Four weeks - 400 US\$ (equivalent in Sri Lankan rupees).
 - Between four to eight weeks - 550 US\$ (equivalent in Sri Lankan rupees).
- Selective programmes: US\$ 1100
- Short course in tropical medicine and infectious diseases
 - 2-3 weeks (US\$ 1000)

Q - What is the procedure of application?

- Apply online. <http://medical.sjp.ac.lk/electives-overview/>
- Send a brief CV and a letter from your Medical school confirming your medical studentship to electives@sjp.ac.lk

Q - What happens after I send an application and required documents?

Your request will be forwarded for checking the eligibility and documents. Once the application is accepted you will receive an official letter from the office of the Dean awarding an elective. Rest of the official procedures will commence following your successful onsite registration at the office of the Senior Assistant Registrar.

Q - I need to get an approval letter immediately for official purposes. Is that possible?

Yes, just let us know how urgent it is. We will do our best to assist you.

Q - I need to arrange an elective within couple to weeks. Is that possible?

Yes. We can arrange this and issue you a letter.

Q - Few of us from the same university would like to do our electives together as a group. Is that possible?

Yes. If you are applying for similar disciplines during same time period, you will anyway be placed together.

Q - What are the 'inappropriate clothing' inside the university and hospital?

Pairs of shorts, tights, short dresses, tank tops, skinnies etc. are not considered appropriate inside the hospital or University. White over coat is a must in the hospital settings except in intensive care units and operation theatres etc.

Q - I have done an elective in a previous academic year. Can I do another elective?

Yes, you can. Send us a request and we will do the needful. But within a year maximum time allowed is only 8 weeks.

Q - What should I do if I have change of plans?

We may be able to arrange different dates for the elective but this facility will not be available at every instance and you should discuss with the elective coordinator.

Q - What is the refund policy in case of online payments done if unable to come?

Students, who pay but do not take up a placement, will receive a 90% refund irrespective of the amount

Q – For information on appropriate Clothing, accommodation and visa

Q - Do I need health Insurance to enter Sri Lanka?

Health insurance is not essential to enter or stay in Sri Lanka but in cases of ill health during the applicant’s stay, costs incurred should be borne by the individual. Government hospital services are free for all including foreigners.

Q - Are there any specific immunization or prophylaxis that I need to get prior to the visit?

There are no specific immunizations or drug prophylaxis needed prior to the visit. Sri Lanka is quite a safe place in terms of health is concerned.

Q - Is post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) available in Sri Lanka?

Availability of post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) cannot be predicted at all times. Post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) for certain diseases are available but may go out of stock at any time. When available in the government sector it can be provided but if it is out of stock you may have to purchase them from private sector pharmacies or import from abroad. In such instances you will have to bear the cost. (Visit elective web page for the list of access points to PEP)

Q - Do I need to bring my own health safety consumables related to universal precautions?

Adherence to universal precautions will be as appropriate and when necessary but may be subjected to availability. Gloves, goggles, aprons and masks are available at the hospital and provided as required or on request. However you may bring your own gloves if you need non-allergic type or any specific brand.

Q- What are health care facilities available in Sri Lanka?

There are plenty of government and private hospitals and private dispensaries all over the island. They offer treatment on outpatient basis or admit patients for further care round the clock. The government hospitals are free for all including foreigners but waiting time varies from 5 minutes to longer. Charges in the private sector differ depending on the institutional policy.

Channeling a specialist doctor can be done online (echanellingsrilanka <http://www.echannelling.com>) and levy will be over Rs.2000 (prescription only). General practitioners (GPs) charge around Rs.750-1000 with or without medicine. The waiting time may be 1-2 hours to see a specialist and up to 15-30 minutes for a GP.

In an emergency, you can rush to the nearest government hospital for reliable treatment and service. For minor health problems, you can walk to a GP clinic and you do not need prior appointments.
